AGE-FRIENDLY HOUSING & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

This small group discussion considered the following four questions:

- 1. The home and neighborhood in which seniors live, work and retire matter more than at many other points in their lives. Envision an age-friendly community. What would it look like?
- 2. How can we increase access to affordable housing for seniors?
- 3. How can the needs of seniors around the built environment be better represented in transportation, public health, and regional planning?
- 4. What kinds of systems or structures would need to be in place to move from idea to action?

The group generated the following insights and ideas:

- Envision age-friendly:
 - walkable
 - accessible services and amenities
 - gathering place centers
 - Continuum of housing types (single family → high rise)
 - Multigenerational
 - Pet-friendly
- Access to affordable housing
 - Build more (scattered)
 - Refurbish existing vacant structures
 - Maintain older housing stock support (aging in place)
 - Tax incentives and other policies
 - Shift culture open to new configurations
- Systems and structures
 - Task forces
 - Political mobilization
 - Monitoring and evaluation
 - Accountability
 - Older Adult Participation
- Transportation, public health, planning
 - Include in county and city general plans
 - Panel review of systems, services and strategic plans how are needs being met?
 - Community outreach "place matters" principles
