

Alameda County's Older Adult Population Status and Trends

How Many

- Over 201,297 people age 65+ live in Alameda County.ⁱ
- By 2020, that number is expected to increase by over 60,000 people.ⁱⁱ
- By 2030, Alameda County will be home to 368,000 people age 65+.ⁱⁱⁱ

Economic Status

- Census data tells us that 1 in 4 of elderly couples live below 200% of the Poverty Level.^{iv}
- But 3 out of 4 single Alameda County seniors live below 200% of the Poverty Level, and well below the Elder Economic Security Index – a measure of what it takes to meet basic needs.^v
- One in five calls to the Alameda County Community Food Bank are from older adults.^{vi}

Health and Disability

- Over 68,000 seniors age 65+ have a disability (hearing, vision, cognitive, mobility, self care).^{vii}
- Of those, over 32,000 indicate that they have “independent living difficulty.”^{viii}
- Over 28% of Alameda County seniors age 65+ have fair to poor health status.^{ix}
- Over 66% have high blood pressure; over 18% have heart disease.^x
- Over 14% experience frequent mental distress.^{xi}

Living Situation

- About 75% of seniors who live below the Elder Economic Security Standard are renters.^{xii}
- Over 60% of seniors who rent their homes have a housing cost burden well over 30% of their total household income.^{xiii}
- Over 42,000 seniors age 65+ live alone, a majority of them women.^{xiv} Living alone puts older adults at greater risk of isolation and associated serious cognitive and health consequences.^{xv}

Coverage for Health Care and LTSS

- 98% seniors age 65+ have Medicare coverage, which typically covers 50% of medical care costs but does not cover long term care services.^{xvi}
- Over 41,000 of those with Medicare also have Medi-Cal coverage.^{xvii}
- Over 10,000 seniors age 65+ have Medi-Cal only.^{xviii}
- Over 12,400 seniors receive Medi-Cal funded In-Home Supportive Services.^{xix}
